Clairvaux Farm Update

It was just a year ago last May that Clairvaux Farm closed. Sometimes, in the course of human plans, the Spirit of God intervenes to lead in a new and different direction. We believe that is what happened. Now, exactly a year later, Clairvaux Farm is open again and its ministry is alive, well, and growing.

Even more than this: it is undergoing a rebirth of spirit. We have completed the renovation of the first residence building, which is now occupied with two families, and are we far along to completing the second. We hope to have the third (the main residence building) completed by mid-summer and this will greatly increase our capacity for families with children experiencing homelessness. The mission trips and work camps we have scheduled for spring and summer will play a vital role in this.

Clairvaux Farm is a place of refuge for families experiencing homelessness, but it is much more. It is an empowering community: a peaceful, beautiful and friendly village-home. The mission is to offer parents and their children the resources and encouragement necessary to develop a happy, hopeful, and fulfilled life. Our concept of transition and reintegration includes housing and individualized support, with the goal of ending each family's homelessness. Our partnership includes persons who were homeless and other committed volunteers, churches, service groups, and businesses.

Deep Roots is our specialized program focused on children and young people who have experienced homelessness. In April, as part of our monthly planned activities, we had a grand Easter egg hunt at Clairvaux Farm. Children of all ages scoured the

lawn for over 400 hidden plastic eggs! One four-year-old girl, who has come with her siblings to most all of our events, collected a grocery bag full of eggs and she would not let them go. She had to lug it around with two hands! She was so worried about losing her collected treasure that she sat at the top of the slide scared to come down because her huge bag was throwing her off balance! A nearby adult volunteer was honored when she trusted him to hold the bag until she slid down, whereupon she quickly took it back! So many children who have been homeless, or who live on the margins, are fearful of any further loss in their lives, and it shows constantly in many ways.

Deep Roots aims to replace fear and insecurity with confidence and happiness. It is the basis of future success and the end of a vicious cycle of homelessness that breaks young spirits.

How Homelessness Spans Generations

Deep Roots at Clairvaux Farm Leadership Team meets once a week to consider families that need our support and how we can best help each one. Several weeks ago we got a call from a grandmother who was looking for help for her pregnant daughter, due in October, and her two grandchildren, ages 1 and 4. As a community, we knew both the grandparents and the parents.

This mother has been homeless since she was 12. She lost her youngest brother when social services took him away from the family when he was 9. She has 3 older children, two of whom were taken by the biological father and given to his parents to raise. The third child, whose biological father was deported, was adopted by a family after her mother had disappeared for several years. The second grandmother, now deceased, was a longtime resident in a homeless shelter, and the second grandfather, also long-term homeless, whereabouts unknown, has just resurfaced in Cecil County.

The first set of grandparents have lived for the last 13 years moving from place to place for a few weeks at a time; often living in a tent in Marina Park in Elkton. Their oldest grandchild even lived in a tent at the tender age of 4 after the rotating shelter closed. At one point the great grandmother offered gas money to anyone who would bring this child (then held by social services) to her trailer, where she was leasing space to another couple to make ends meet. Needless to say, she was not able to care for the child. Her daughter, mentioned previously, is the one who lost her youngest son to social services.

The father of the 1 and 4 year old just got out of jail in December after serving 17 months of a six year sentence. He refused to pay child support and insisted on paternity testing. He has spent most of his adult life in prison, once getting additional time for beating another inmate. In a twist of fate, he filed for custody and in early May was awarded custody of the 1 and 4 year old. Now their mother no longer needs help from Deep Roots at Clairvaux Farm but the father might, and she may yet be asking for help in October after she delivers.

You may wonder why I am telling this long and complicated story of inter-generational homelessness. A person who has not seen it firsthand may not even begin to realize how children are caught in a repeating cycle of neglect and abuse. Homelessness thus often becomes ingrained in their lives as it has in the lives of their parents and grandparents.

The mother's oldest child, the

one previously mentioned who was adopted, now lives in a stable home and is getting academic achievement awards. The cycle of homelessness can be broken for children by caring stable adults. While adoption may be a solution for children who have been completely abandoned, it is obviously not the answer for most. However, all children who have experienced homelessness need stable mentors, even if they otherwise have caring families.

All children need solid anchors in their lives, but children who have experienced homelessness especially need a community of role models and peers to support them in rising above the chaos of their everyday life. They need love and commitment, and to be part of a "village" of hope and friendship to create the opportunity for them to break the cycle of homelessness. They need you and me, and communities like Deep Roots. We always ask and need your help to support them and we are deeply grateful for it.
